Breamore Walk

Breamore is a village and civil parish near Fordingbridge, Hampshire. Within the parish lies Breamore House, it was the site of a priory of Augustinian Canons founded in the early 12th century. The priory was dissolved in 1536 and no trace of it now remains, with Breamore House being built on the same land it was completed in 1583 and was an Elizabethan Manor house. Much of it was destroyed by fire in the 1800s but it was rebuilt in the same style using what was salvageable and with some magnificent chimneys. Alongside is the Anglo Saxon parish church of St Mary where a 1,000 year old Yew Tree stands within the churchyard. The estate borders the New Forest, it is part of the Cranborne Chase & West Wiltshire Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Edward Hulse M.D. the Court Physician to William III in England purchased Breamore Estate in 1748. It still remains their family home over two and a half century's later.

Our walk took us around the outer reaches of the estate. We walked along Upper Street then turned off along Long Steeple Lane towards Whitsbury, bypassing it to reach Breamore Down where we stopped to have lunch. We should have seen a field of blue flax growing growing on the down hillside, as seen by Jean and Richard when they did the recce a few days prior to our walk. Unfortunately for us the flowers had closed up due to the recent rain. We did see some Lesser Burdock with leafmine trails, after some research we believe them to be most likely leafmining larvae of a fly *Phytomyza lappae* which mines in the leaves of Burdock. We reached the Breamore Mizmaze set at the top of the down hill in a copse of yew and hazel, it is believed that the mizmaze was created by the monks dating back to the 12th or 13th century. It is only one of two surviving mizmazes and is protected. We returned back, walking through Breamore Wood passing the house to reach our starting point where we visited the cafe.
