
RINGWOOD NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY

Canada Common is found by leaving the roundabout on the A36 road which runs between Salisbury and Totton at West Wellow, leading onto Canada Road and the small hamlet of Canada situated just within the northern New Forest Boundary. The walk started at Canada Common car park, found down Plantation Road which runs from the hamlet. Canada is believed to be so called after a well-traveled gentleman Thomas Becket, who before settling here around 1867 had lived in Canada the country nine years previously. We started by walking across the common towards Deazle Wood. The commons are heavily grazed by local farmers and commoners stock, ponies, cattle, donkeys and pigs all roam free. There are steams dotted around the commons, as a result it can be marshy and muddy underfoot. We reached Penn Common which borders the small village of Bramshaw and passing by houses bordering the common. Penn Common is an adjacent common of the National Trust owned Bramshaw Commons. Returning back to Canada Common we reached our cars and finished off the day with a picnic lunch.
