


After the prolonged period of this summers heatwave, it came as bit of a surprise to find it raining today. Edmondsham House is a stately Tudor home with Georgian additions. In 1563 Thomas Hussey bought Edmondsham Manor and it has been owned by his family ever since. Today it is owned and run by Mrs Julia Smith who met us after our very wet and soggy walk and provided us with tea and cake, she explained more of the houses history. A previous house built on this site was mentioned in the Doomsday Book of 1086 and the foundations are still to be found in the existing buildings cellars. The site features an organic walled garden, and 6 acre garden with unusual trees and spring bulbs. There is a 12th-century church nearby. Our walk took us to Castle Hill within the estate. It was thought to be a Norman type of Motte and Bailey Castle, the motte being the hillock or mound with a wooden or stone keep, accompanied by a walled courtyard or bailey and surrounded by a protective ditch and palisade. It has fairly recently been revealed as a much earlier earthworks constructed in Neolithic time around 4,500n years ago (late Stone Age). Our thanks to Mrs Smith for her hospitality and providing our tea and cake and to Sonia Wilkinson for organizing.

Unfortunately, there was not much to report for the walk because of the heavy and persistent rain.
