Our walk started from Vereley car park found on the road leading from Picket Post turn off from the A31 to Burley. A path lead us through Vereley Wood then past Vereley Farm and onwards crossing a small bridge over Mill Lawn Brook, then over heathland to reach Ridley Wood. This ancient wood is a glorious woodland, with lots of fine oak, birch and beech trees. From medieval times the wood was used for coppicing, the traditional method of woodland management in which young tree stems are periodically cut down to near ground level. The wood was also an ancient haunt of smugglers, who brought their wares up from the coast and sold the contraband in a gully close to the southern tip of the wood. After walking through the wood we walked towards Old House, then circled round across Ridley Plain, to return to Ridley Wood and then across Picket Plain back to the car park.

We were pleasantly surprised to find 25 species of fungi in late December. Many thanks to Bill Syratt for his help with identification.
