Our walk started at Whitefield Moor car park, situated on Rhinefield Road which leads into the north eastern side of Brockenhurst. During World War 2 this site was part of several thousand acres ploughed up to grow crops under the New Forest Pastoral Developments Scheme. Once the war was over it was ploughed again and sown with clover and grasses and became pasture superior to that of natural forest lawn. We crossed Ober Water to walk alongside it to a second bridge, crossing back to return walking over Whitefield Moor to enjoy a picnic lunch, where we were joined by five non walkers. The walk passes a variety of habitats around Ober Water, including heathland with gorse and bog, grassland, natural and formerly enclosed woodland, and Ober Water stream itself.
